'Ubuntu' means "I am because you are." The word is part of the Zulu phrase "Umuntu ngumuntu ngabantu," which literally means that a person is a person through other people. Ubuntu is that nebulous concept - of common humanity, of oneness.


The Learners Community tries to embody the essence of Ubuntu, practised by remembering that we are all deeply interconnected and acutely affected by each other.

It is the Learners Community that led to the concrete actualization of its ideas in the form of this school - thereby preceding it.

At Learners International School, when we engage with our little learners, our parents, our team, facilitators, and staff, we do not just refer to them as stakeholders. We look at them as our community - a community of lifelong learning and impact. Our community is an ecosystem of growth, compassion and trust. It is personal and has immense power.

A community is a set of people who are kindred spirits. What brings them together is their belief system and common goals. With a culture of 'community', it is easier to work towards those goals through collaboration. This spread over a long tenure, continuously integrated into who we are, leads to a community of practice. The concept was first proposed by cognitive anthropologist Jean Lave and educational theorist Etienne Wenger in their 1991 book Situated Learning. A community of practice is built as a support network for people who share a common role and a set of common goals. It creates learning opportunities, builds capability and knowledge sharing, and regulates all of it in tandem.

It is only through community that we can raise a generation of learners who believe in coexistence over competition and are empathetic, curious, open to change and unafraid to ask questions.





AT THE CORE OF LIVING AND LEARNING : LIFE SKILLS

Life skills are valuable lessons and adaptive and positive behaviours that enable humans to deal effectively with the demands and challenges of life. This concept is also often termed psychosocial competence. This kind of competence, emotional and psychosocial, is put to test beyond school, but often people find it difficult to suddenly inculcate these in themselves at that point. Hence, **early intervention is vital. The sooner learners understand life skills, the sooner they adapt them**.

Life skills are not equations that one has to learn to solve. They are just a critical value system to carry within, through life. **Many educationists**, **boards**, **and institutes globally are now calling to include life skills in school curricula**. Soft skills like communication, team management and conflict solving are essential for all aspects and phases of one's life.

At Learners International School, we recognize this need. Therefore, we have **integrated life skills into our curriculum**. Our priority is to give our learners a **supportive learning environment**, using an **experiential approach** that only amplifies the impact of what they learn at the school. Practical lessons on life skills begin right from the beginning – for example, building on **interpersonal** and **communication skills** by learning how to resolve a conflict with a peer verbally.

At Learners, we bring in music, art and dance to build **expression** and **creative thinking**, so that young learners start **expressing their thoughts**, **feelings**, **and beliefs** through various modalities. An abundance of green spaces around encourages them to engage in openair activities, instilling in them an awareness of the importance of environment and sustainability. This is compounded by consistent environmental initiatives to stimulate an **action-based** and **problem-solving approach**.

Learners is also home to a heartfelt and comprehensive Wellbeing Program as a part of LEEP, which focuses on building **resilience**, a crucial life skill.

Life skills must also be taught and practiced at home, and it is easy to do so via everyday tasks. Teaching a child to get to class or a friend's or relative's birthday party on time today will someday help them get to a work meeting on time.

The sandpit has lots of toys and games for our learners to have fun with as they explore its arresting textures and jump around in it. It transports them to an imaginary world!






THE SPLASH PAD KINGDOM




