The ability and desire to create and make is innate and universal. Our Makers' Programme is intended to counter this tendency and embed the makers' belief deep within learners. Learning through making has the power to revolutionize education by empowering learners to see themselves in the role of creators as opposed to only consumers. Developing a culture of entrepreneurship amongst the learners is at the core of Learners' mission. Rapid digitalisation of the world has created a dire need for creating conducive digital surroundings in learning spaces. To truly transform education, one needs not only to build a maker space but build and sustain a culture of creative expertise, inventive thinking, and effective problem-solving.







Our Makers' Programme includes Machine Learning, Artificial intelligence, Carpentry, Aeromodelling, Astronomy, and Robotics, making these alluring fields more accessible than ever before. This month learners explored the possibilities of the robotics programme by integrating the theme of travel. They made different modes of transport as an extension to their learning experiences.

Besides being a tool for innovation, the Makers Programme instills an understanding of how the world works. It helps kids to discover their own misconceptions and tests their own ideas through the use of technology.
