

TALK FROM OUR TEAM

We asked our facilitators -What impact does professional development spaces create and how do they add to your growth? Let's find out!



As a teacher, I believe one has to be in a learning mode as the techniques, patterns, and strategies in teaching are evolving. As a new to Cambridge approach in teaching, I thought things would be very different from what my learning and understanding are as per the Scandinavian approach, however with the continuous training I understood that the goals are the same but the approach and terminologies are different. These training sessions added to my learning and understanding of strategies, setting goals, etc. With the help of these training sessions, I am able to design UBD and Curriculums confidently.

"We as facilitators were given excellent opportunities to hone our professional skills, be it to develop our online teaching skills through Microsoft Teams or Cambridge workshops. 
PERSPECTIVES FROM PARENTS

"The role of a community member is to make the young children aware of different ways by which he/ she can contribute in the conservation of wildlife and also encourage him/her in doing his/her bit."




